In tough times, when we are conflicted and pulled in many directions it is difficult to see a clear path in life, so we often become ambivalent. And we know it; we feel compelled to do something about it, but somehow we can't because we don't see a clear path towards doing what is right.

We feel compelled to do something, but then somehow just say, "I can only do so much." However, stewardship provides a clear path; it gives us a road-map toward allocating the precious time, talent and resources that God has given us. In living the whole of our lives to glorify God we can find clear decisions that lead us down the right path.

This includes taking good care of our bodies, our brains, and our spirit, as well as how we minister to our families, how we care for one another in God's kingdom. The conflict and ambivalence that we may feel can be conquered!

This month's issue of *Stewardship* points out that the conflict leading to ambivalence is everywhere and that all Christians can be plagued with difficult choices. Some advise: "Just say No." Others say, "Enough is enough." This doesn't sit well with many of our personal beliefs. In keeping with Christian beliefs, we need to find ways to "Just say Yes!" A former pastor once advised, "Give until it hurts." This is consistent with the belief that one is never done repaying our debt to God!

Prayer: Let us not find our rest, Lord, until we are dedicated stewards of all that we have. **Amen**



Thank you, for your giving heart, for the love you have for the people of Guatemala, for your prayers, and selfless contributions.

Time is a funny thing. There are days that seem to last a year and there are days that seem to last a second. Very rarely does anyone say, "Wow! That day felt like one day." With the uncertainty we're facing and the differing opinions we're hearing we need to rest on what is true. The only true and certain thing we can hold on to is our God "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever" Hebrews 13:8. For the next few months we know many of you will have to make tough decisions about leaving the house, going back to work, traveling, finances, school, etc. These decisions are hard enough to make, but add a pandemic and suddenly, it just got harder to make every decision. This is our prayer for the days to come:

'God please give everyone wisdom and knowledge, and may the Holy Spirit convict us and give us peace in every decision needing to be made. In Jesus' name, Amen.'



What to do and not do during a crisis

In Acts 27 we hear a fascinating story about Paul's third mission trip; he was traveling to Rome. There was a huge storm that was so powerful they couldn't control the boat. And in the middle of this storm the sailors decided to do three things we should never do in the middle of a crisis. Acts 27:15b says, "we gave up trying and let it be carried along by the wind." (GNT)

1. Never, never give up. Stand firm. Paul says, a few times in the New Testament, "So then, my dear friends, stand firm and steady" 1 Corinthians 15:58 (GNT).

- 2. Another mistake that the sailors made is found in verse 19, "and on the following day they threw part of the ship's equipment overboard" (GNT). Don't throw away your equipment -- the good things that you have. Don't throw away your marriage, your relationships, and don't throw away your principles. Here in the U.S. as well as many other countries (probably every country) we have heard that violence and abuse in the home has gone up during this time; people are letting go of their principles. Don't throw away your principles, don't throw away the good things you have. Keep the good things. Keep faith. Keep hope. Keep love.
- 3. Verse 20 says, "We finally gave up all hope of being saved" (GNT). Never give up hope. Please, don't ever give up hope. The Word of God talks to us a lot about hope. Paul says, 'Jesus Christ himself is our hope of glory."

But there are also things we must do during this time. Verse 22 says, "And now I exhort you to be of good cheer" (KJV). Don't be discouraged.

- 1. Verse 24 says, "Don't be afraid." We find these words "Don't be afraid", so many times in the Bible. It's repeated multiple times!
- 2. Verse 25 says, "For I trust in God" (GNT). These are the words Paul spoke to the sailors. Let's put all our trust in God.
- 3. Verse 33-38 talks about how we must take care of ourselves and take care of those around us. That's why in verse 34 Paul says, "I beg you, then, eat some food" (GNT). He goes on to say that it's good for their health. Let's take care of our health. Let's eat healthy, exercise, read the Bible, and pray. Then verse 35 goes on to say, "After saying this, Paul took some bread, gave thanks to God before them all, broke it, and began to eat" (GNT). Paul had a lot of faith. He said in verse 34, "Not even a hair of your heads will be lost" (GNT). Let's keep our faith alive every day.

I hope that you will take the things you should do and not do and put them into practice during this time.

FOOD BAGS & WATER

Wow! Wow! We are completely blown away at how many of you God is using to answer our prayers! He is so Good! We have enough funds so far to help about 400 families! Thank you for your gifts and compassion. As mentioned in our previous e-letter, you will be helping families from different parts of the country. We are getting organized and praying for the best way to deliver the food. Since the people being helped are in different areas we need to know the laws, rules, and regulations for each area so that our actions to help don't turn into a chaotic mess.

With the help you have provided we also will be able to take two, what we call "water cisterns," to areas in much need of water. In the two communities in Guatemala City there is a tremendous need for water to drink, to use for cooking, washing dishes and clothing, and bathing. The pastor there tells us that people are already coming down with many infections due to the lack of water. Personal hygiene is way down on the list when you need water to drink more than to bathe. We will include purified water in the food bags and hope that we can provide the cisterns at least twice a month until things go back to a more "normal" way of life.

As our staff comes up with a plan and works on logistics to give out bags, we ask that you please lift us in prayer. We want to make sure we are supporting our local government and the rules they have set in place to protect the people here. We need to be an example and not the cause of commotion and confusion.

We hope to soon be able to share pictures of what your thoughtful and generous gifts have done for the people in Guatemala. Our staff is working hard and as we brainstorm and plan for the future, we want to be sure to help those around us to learn to fish for a lifetime.

Since I was 18 years old I knew God was calling me to ministry. When I was 20 I had the privilege of being the president for all the Christian youth in Guatemala. Then God provided so that I could study in Seminary. That's when Impacto started. It began with a friend from Argentina when he invited me to join his ministry efforts which was preaching on the radio. So, for a long time I preached on the radio. At first, there were 25 stations that played our sermons. Eventually we were being heard on 700 radio stations in Spanish-speaking countries around the world.

My friend had a group of pastors who dedicated themselves to preach at evangelistic crusades. I was always a huge believer in evangelistic groups. I have never liked to work alone and have always felt that when you work in a group you have accountability. After ministering alongside him for quite some time God called me to focus on the ministry effort in Guatemala. God surrounded me with amazing people, not only in Guatemala but in the U.S.A., too. I don't want to make this too long so I can't tell you every single name nor every blessing God sent through each of them. It's a fact that to be a good leader you need good people surrounding and working alongside you. Moses had a work group, Joshua had one, and, of course, Jesus had a group He worked. To this day, I'm a firm believer in group work and God has given me a great group to work with. A group that, during this pandemic, I have seen their walk in God stand firm as well as their desire to continue sharing about Christ with others.

In the 1990's Dinora and I moved our family to the U.S.A. We planted over 7 churches and I started traveling to Guatemala with mission teams. We didn't know the magnitude short-term mission teams would play in Impacto Ministry. Back then Impacto was a small part of our ministry and we didn't know we would establish such long-term ministries and projects. I know God has many who are willing to share the Gospel full time and I am humbled and

honored that He called me to do it in the beautiful country of Guatemala.

Dear Siblings in Christ,

To be honest with you I don't know where to start. The killing of George Floyd by police officers in Minneapolis continues to play itself out across my television screen as I watch it over and over again, not out of a sense of the macabre but out of a place of deep sorrow and disbelief that this has happened again. Only a few days ago we watched videos regarding the killing of Ahmaud Arbery that took place in February and was recently being brought to light. And after Ahmaud Abery there was Breonna Taylor and last October there was Atatiana Jefferson and before her was...a long, long list of black and brown people whose lives were needlessly taken by violence in a society that continues to not only remain broken but break even further.

On CNN last evening one of the persons being interviewed said, "I think this country has reached a tipping point." I pray that is so. I pray that the balance tips us into a space where we can no longer ignore the cries of injustice of our black and brown sisters and brothers, no longer stand silent while racist and bigoted remarks are so easily tossed around by leadership, no longer stand speechless as we watch another person, created in the image of God and deeply loved by God, be killed or demeaned or slighted or discriminated against or denied or marginalized because of the color of their skin or ethnic background or family history. We must begin to speak and speak loudly against this ongoing nightmare in which our sisters and brothers live and in which we participate.

And we must begin that conversation admitting our own realities. I confess to you, as I did to two of my colleagues yesterday during two separate phone calls, that I am not free of racism and that I struggle to fully comprehend my white privilege. I confess to you that I was once more complicit in this in my past than I care to realize. And, I confess to you that I have much work to do before I get to where I need to be in this dialogue to change the balance of inequality that exists in this country as we move forward to face these realities and find resolution for the pandemic of racism that runs silently through systems and lives with little recognition or knowledge on our part. It is time to talk, to talk honestly and from our places of great vulnerability, giving voice to our own shortcomings and failures, our own racism and white privilege.

It is also time, in that space of vulnerability to listen. To listen deeply to the realities and stories of our sisters and brothers in the black and brown communities. To listen deeply to the hurt and pain and righteous anger for what is not only occurring now but for what has taken place for centuries. To listen deeply to our own hearts and minds and confess our sins and failures and silence. Then, and only then, will we be able to move forward in a conversation that is honest yet painful and, at best, challenging for us to be involved with in our relationship with others.

In these days I pray for the family of George Floyd, a father, a brother, a friend, a co-worker, a companion on the way, a bright and shining light. I pray they may find comfort in the promise of the resurrection. And I pray that they may know that his death will lead us to new learnings and new life and hope for change and a new direction in this country.

I invite you to join me in this prayer, in vulnerability, in honesty, in perseverance, in hope, in faith, in conversation and in the hard, hard work we have before us.

May the One who is faithful prod us and motivate us and, if need be, shove us forward into the hopeful future held out by our Lord Jesus Christ 'that all may be one.'
